2. No distinguishing marks to be on exhibits.
3. Judges may give special awards if work merits it.
4. Cut flowers will be sold for show funds.
5. No exhibits to be removed before 4.00pm without permission from steward in charge.
6. No article to be removed without production of exhibitor's card.
7. All exhibits must be removed by 5.00pm if prior arrangement has not been made with the chief steward, and will be removed at owner's risk. Articles to have name, address on separate paper, pinned or taped.
8. Trophies for most points in each section.
9. Weldon Memorial Trophy for the highest aggregate points obtained in the Home Produce, Handcraft and Horticulture sections.
10. Entries for Sections A (Flowers) and B (Floral Art) will be received up to 7.30pm on Friday night, 11 November 2011. Judged at 8.00pm. All flowers to be grown by exhibitor, except Floral Art.
11. Entries for Sections C (Knitwear), D (Needlework) and G (Handcraft) will be received up until 2.00pm on Friday 11 November, 2011. Judged at 2.30pm sharp so **NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.**
12. Exhibits E (Cooking), F (Home Produce) and I (Cookery), 4 entries from one exhibitor or group, will be received up to 5.00pm on Friday 11 November, 2011. Judged at 5.30pm so **NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.**
13. Handcraft Pavilion will be open Thursday night, 10 November, 2011 from 6pm - 8pm, as an added convenience for exhibitors.

INEXPENSIVE FRUIT CAKE RECIPE:

INGREDIENTS:

185g (6oz) butter
2 teaspoons vinegar
½ teaspoon almond essence
1 teaspoon vanilla essence
285g (10oz) flour
1 egg
1 cup sugar
250g (½lb) mixed fruit
1 cup milk with teaspoon soda dissolved in it.

METHOD:

Cream butter and sugar, add egg, vinegar and fruit, then flour and milk alternatively. Bake moderate oven 1½ hours.

STATE COMPETITION - INEXPENSIVE FRUIT CAKE

The winner of this class (197) will be eligible to enter the State Competition competing against winners baking the same recipe exhibited at other Tasmanian Agricultural Shows. The State Competition will be judged at the 2012 Royal Hobart Show by a noted judge, with the overall State winner receiving \$250 sponsored by the Agricultural Show Council of Tasmania
